

Punctuation

A QUICK RECAP

Capital Letters are used:

1. at the start of sentences.
2. with proper nouns.
Examples: Martha, Madrid

Full Stops are used:

1. at the end of sentences.
2. at the end of shortened words.
Example: Mr.

Question Marks are used after questions.

Exclamation Marks are used after exclamations. Example: Oh!

Commas:

1. separate parts of a sentence.
2. separate words in a list.
3. are used before and after quotation marks.
Example: "I like sweets," said Bill.


Quotation Marks are used to show spoken words.


Tricky twenty triangle

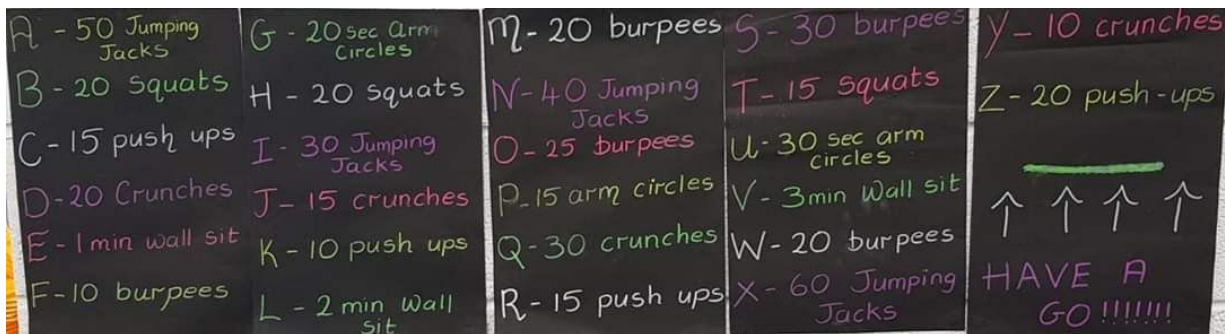
